

## **Pinot Noir**

### **Russian River Valley**

*Russian River Pinot is distinguished by its overall complexity and characters of intense cherry, blueberry and raspberry flavors, along with interesting spice and herb notes (kola, cinnamon, tarragon and rosemary), laced with a clean earthiness often described as forest floor and wild mushrooms. This cold neighborhood, with all its little nooks and crannies, is best characterized by reds of bright, berry fruit, substantial tannins, balanced acidity and great ageability.*

### **Green Valley**

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### **Sonoma**

*Adjacent to the Russian River Valley, portions of the Sonoma Coast offer a unique climate zone - the coolest area in Sonoma County. Cool, moist air from the Pacific Ocean and cooling winds and fog pour in through the Petaluma Wind Gap, creating ideal conditions for growing Pinot Noir. As a result of these unique characteristics, the Sonoma Coast is recognized as a premier source for exceptional Pinot Noir and Pinot Gris varietal wines. Aromas and flavors of red currant, raspberry, sage, mushroom, and fresh, earthy notes.*

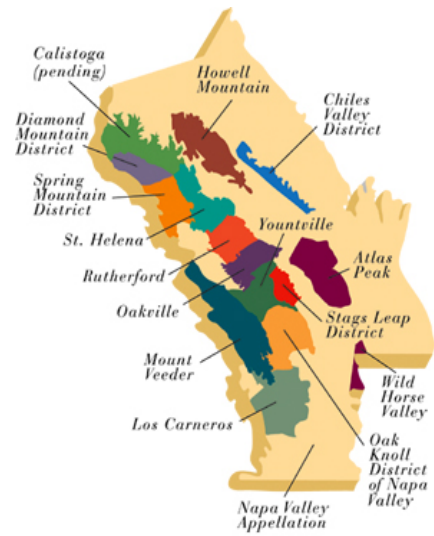
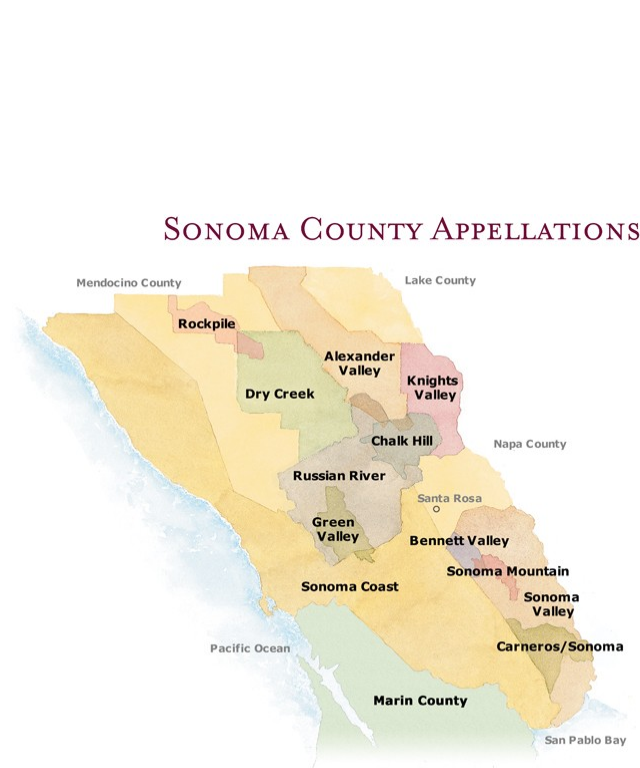

### **Syrah**

*Syrah forms intense wines, with deep violet, nearly black color, chewy texture and richness, and often alcoholic strength, with aromas that tend to be more spicy than fruity. The climate in the Russian River Valley is similar to that of the northern Rhone Valley of France, Syrah's ancestral home, and the wines are stylistically similar to the wines from this region. Deep, rich ruby color is a hallmark of this Syrah.*

### **Sonoma**

*Zinfandel from Sonoma County has been generally characterized as having full, intense blackberry fruit aromas that mingle with spicy black pepper, anise and allspice scents. Sonoma Valley is a slightly cooler region, these wines are quite lush and feature plenty of black pepper and spice.*

## Merlot, Meritage & Other Red Blends

### Merlot

*The Merlot grape is a close cousin to Cabernet Sauvignon in many respects. It is lower in tannins and makes wines that mature faster and are softer.. Merlot is often blended with Cabernet Sauvignon in order to soften the blend. At its best, Merlot makes a wine that is dry, rich in flavor and smooth as it finishes in your throat. Merlot usually has ripe berry components in the bouquet. Its wines tend to be soft, fruity and smooth in texture.*

### Meritage & Blends

*Red Meritage wines historically have been among the world’s most highly rated wines. They are prized for their smooth, silky texture and complex, robust structure. While they age beautifully — often for decades — most are also very drinkable in their younger years.*

*A Red Meritage is a blend of two or more of the red “noble” Bordeaux varieties — Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc, Malbec, Merlot and Petit Verdot. If the blend includes any other grape variety, it is, by definition, **not** a Meritage. Also, to qualify as a Meritage, no single grape variety can make up more than 90% of the blend.*

## **Cabernet Sauvignon**

*This noble varietal is an international darling, planted practically everywhere. It originally hails from Bordeaux in France, California meanwhile — specifically Napa Valley — is happy to be Cab's home away from home. The flavors, packed with notes of blackberry pie, cassis, black currant and sometimes accents of chocolate or mint, depending on where it's been grown.*

*In warmer, sunnier climates, the fruit gets riper and sweeter; cooler spots like Bordeaux and parts of Sonoma, hold the fruit in check a bit more, and earthier notes come through.*

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## **California “Gets” the Boot!**

*When you think of it, it makes perfect sense that quite a few California wines are made from Italian varieties. First of all, so many California wineries were founded by first or second generation Italian-American families—Gallo, Robert Mondavi, Louis Martini, Sebastiani, Simi, Seghesio, Foppiano, Trinchero, Rochioli, Martinelli and Rafenelli—to name some of them. Secondly, the rise in popularity of Italian wines in the U.S. during the past twenty years has spawned a new interest among consumers for ‘Cal-Ital’ wines, as these California wines made from Italian varieties are commonly known.*

*The Sangiovese grape is Tuscany's most prominent grape, however, many different clonal varieties exist, as many towns have their own local version. The term "Super Tuscan" describes any Tuscan red wine that does not adhere to traditional blending laws for the region and usually include Cabernet.*

### **Piedmont**

*The main grape grown here is Nebbiolo, which is the base for the famed Barolo and Barbaresco.*

*Barbera is the most widely-planted grape in the region. With white wines, Moscato is the most prominent with its sparkling style wines. Cortese grape makes the crisp dry wines of Gavi while the Arneis grape makes vibrant, full bodied wines with notes of pears and apricots.*

And there are so many to choose from – Port, Sherry, Sauternes, Recioto, Passito... so many styles at many different price ranges. Dessert wines are made in a variety of manners. Port and Sherry are both fortified wines, while Sauternes, Tokay and ice wines are all made with grapes affected by botrytis, a noble rot that intensifies the flavors of the grape. Dessert wines vary in level of sweetness, intensity, alcohol and color. Enough to satiate any level of sweet tooth.*

### **Port (3oz portion)**

*Port is a fortified wine that is made by adding brandy during fermentation. The addition of spirits kills the yeasts, which in turn halts the fermentation process. This results in a wine both sweet and high in alcohol. Named for its home city Oporto, true Port must come from the designated area. The grapes used are a blend, but the favored grape thought to be the best is Touriga Nacional. Ports fall into two broad categories: Ruby and Tawny. The main difference here is aging – Ruby ports age in bottle, tawnies age in cask and see a bit of oxygen.*

### **Sherry (3oz portion)**

*Sherry is a fortified wine made by adding grape spirits after fermentation. The name sherry comes from the English attempt to say Jerez, the southwest coastal region of Spain where Sherry is made. Sherry comes in two basic styles, fino and olorosso. The fino style is pale colored, crisp and dry, while olorosso is much darker and nuttier, and can range from dry to sweet.*
